- We believe the upper level we can consider for this bond is roughly \$1.8 billion

Capacity & Projections – Dr. Chris Hines, *Deputy Superintendent*

- We no longer use portables in trying to estimate a building's capacity (previously used 3-5)
- When we change programs or modify space, we lose capacity
- Capacity can increase by building an addition or modifying a space
- When there is not enough space, we use portables, make additions, rezone, move programs; however, it impacts working conditions and job satisfaction

Proposition A: Can we get some new schools on the books and discuss the pros and cons of each one?

We need to decide on and plug in a number for new land acquisitions

Major Renovations & Master Plans – Easy Foster, CISD Director of Planning & Construction

 Major renovation is determined by the size of the building, overall scope of work, overall budget, and that it stays within confines of the existing structure

- The master plan at Conroe High School was previously approved by two other bond committees and voters – they take multiple bonds to complete
- Developing estimates by talking to project experts, refining numbers every day, and going off historical data (recently bid projects)
- Projects that would total an estimated \$277 million:
 - Continuing the master plan at Oak Ridge High School
 - Addressing aging of The Woodlands High School and Knox Junior High
 - Oak Ridge 9th Grade (built on floating foundation)
 - Creating a master plan for Washington (has reached the end of serviceable life and needs exit strategy for oldest sections of the building)
 - San Jacinto Elementary gym addition/renovation
 - Creighton Elementary addition/renovation

Gyms & Playgrounds – Dr. Shellie Winkler, Assistant Superintendent for Elementary Schools

Gyms

- CISD's goal is for all elementaries to have gyms
- Some schools have a gym that serves as a cafeteria, meeting space, and general purpose area
- PE is a course with State requirements main challenges are master schedule and time
- 16 elementary schools do not have a designated gym
- Malinda Stewart, Wilkinson Principal: "I went from a school without a gym to a school with one. We are able to make better use of the master schedule and have more flexibility."
- Josh Hughes, Wilkerson Principal: "Our new gym has given a sense of community and more involvement. It has given the school a second large venue for events and is a safer play environment with more padding and designated recreational flooring."

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 The approximate cost for each gym addition would be \$5 million

Members were asked to make their top two choices between adding a gym to none, 4, 8, 12 or all 16 schools.

- None: 4 votes
- 4: 35
- 8: 62
- 12: 12
- 16: 45

Playgrounds

- Previously, PTO/PTAs have been the main source for funding of playgrounds, but not all raise the same amount
- There is a District playground fund, mainly for mulch
- There is a Pour in Place surface that allows for people with disabilities (wheelchairs) to access playgrounds, instead of having mulch

Members were asked to make top two choices on how much should be allocated per school for playground upgrades: None, \$250K, \$500K, \$2 million.

- None 26 votes
- \$250,000 67
- \$500,000 **-** 34
- \$750,000 7
- \$2 million 0

- What is the plan for Washington?
 When it was converted into a high school, we did
 not update any of existing building features, but we
 made a promise to there being a campus on that.
 We can start working on older parts of the building,
 mainly with new classrooms wings. It was originally
- What is the difference between Oak Ridge Phase II & III?

That is up to the committee. It could include fine arts, athletics renovations, and/or more interior renovations. We have to determine what is most important to the community. From an ORHS teacher on the committee: Asking teachers to work in a construction zone for eight years is a bit much.

- Because of cost of materials, how are we compensating for additional costs?
 - All numbers will change and are based on inflation. We have been debating whether 12% is the right number. It's a big number, but we're making sure it's the right number. We are trying to make sure we spend every dollar wisely, but we have established a contingency plan if we can't reach the finish line.
- Can playgrounds be outside funded/sponsored by local businesses?

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 What is the payback on the Pour In Place surface (how much money would it save over time compared to mulch) and how long does it last?

It lasts 15 years with a two-year maintenance plan.

- Can you just resurface a playground or do you have to take down the whole structure?
 - You would have to take down the whole structure to resurface it.

Voting

- What do you believe is the voting majority to add items to the bond package?
 - 66% 66.67% of voters
 - 75% 17.71%
 - 50.1% 11.46%
 - 80% 4.17%
